The Rise of NFTs - Opportunities and Legal Issues

As we progress into 2021, the beat of the drum of the cryptocurrency and broader digital asset industry continues and, with it, has come the rise in popularity non-fungible tokens (NFTs). In the month leading up to the writing of this article, a total of more than \$208 million¹ of NFT-based artwork was sold (in primary and secondary sales), as compared to the \$250 million of total NFT volume traded in all of 2020. In addition, creators are utilizing NFTs to generate novel methods of monetizing digital creative works and other experiences, as the music band, the Kings of Leon, accomplished when it released its new album as a limited edition NFT, with six NFTs providing lifetime tickets to front row seats for the band's shows. Further, we are witnessing creators experience a new era of incredible sales figures, like the artist known as Beeple, who sold an NFT representing a collage for \$69 million. Prior to this NFT sale, Beeple had sold his art for as little as \$100. This article explores some of the legal issues behind NFTs and their underlying technology.

Charities Communities of Practice

A new way of learning

SCCA Pro Bono Chapter and Law Society Pro Bono Services collaborated on a new initiative - "Charities' Communities of Practice". The objective is through facilitated discussions, provide a platform for charities to share their knowledge and experiences with each other.

The innovative format of the initiative equipped charities to first have a bird's eye view of a particular topic by attending a webinar, followed by attending a "Communities of Practice" ("CoP") which go in depth into a particular topic. During the CoP, attendees will have an opportunity to hear each other's experiences and have peer-to-peer learning.

The initiative was launched in April 2021 with the first webinar tackling the topic of "Social Media Issues for Charities". Panellists went through common social media issues such as publicising its activities yet protecting its beneficiaries' privacy, dealing with disparaging comments on social media and legal considerations when the charity employees' personal lives on social media impact charities. The webinar was warmly received with more than 400 attendees.

The follow up CoP on “Social Media Policies” focused on small group discussions where attendees heard from Mekhla Basu (Director and Corporate Counsel, APAC at Splunk) and Fong Wei Li (Managing Director, Forward Legal LLC) who gave attendees insight into (1) tips in drafting a social media policy; (2) understanding legal considerations and different stakeholders’ perspectives in crafting a social media policy; (3) strategies in obtaining different stakeholders’ buy-in; and (4) identifying legal & other issues in implementing & enforcing social media policies.

SCCA volunteers served as facilitators for the breakout sessions. During the breakout sessions, attendees discussed the questions raised by the speakers and shared their on-the-ground experiences. They were encouraged to think through the lens of different stakeholders such as the charity management, the charity staff, volunteers/sponsors and the beneficiaries. Through this exercise, attendees developed a better understanding of different stakeholders’ perspectives and trying to strike a balance in trying to operationalise a social media policy.

We also started to look at the Mindful Business Charter and what it means for in-house counsels. In this Announcement 33, we continue the conversation on evolving mindful practices.

- Stress is expected in the legal profession. Some of it self-inflicted and can be avoided. It is important to have self-awareness and engage in conversations with lawyers and clients who have the same issues. The Charter calls for businesses to do things differently. The aim of the Charter is to help adopt rituals and practices in the workplace so as to address and reduce stresses caused by poor working practices/ people management, lack of planning, and communication. It also aims to re-establish demarcation lines for work-life balance in our professional lives which may have been eroded with the advent of technology and intense competitive environments.
